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April was an exciting month with many prevention programs held around the county in regards to it being alcohol awareness month. The goal was to bring evidence-based education and prevention messages regarding youth use of alcohol and the many risks associated with underage drinking. One such program was our annual town hall meetings, held in Newton and in Vernon. Our agency has been participating in SAMHSA Town Hall meetings since 2006, where hundreds of coalitions hold meetings across the county as they work to bring awareness about the issue of underage drinking. Each year we have hosted an event where youth have been a featured part of the program. Youth leaders help to present an interactive program in an effort to dispel myths around underage drinking. Additionally, we honored the many

students who participate in our annual PSA contest for alcohol awareness month as we are proud to share their many wonderful messages. Both events featured a packed house of parents, educators, community members and students who joined together to hear the latest research and news about underage drinking. http://centerforprevention.org/alcohol-awareness-contest/

We thank Senator Steven Oroho for being a presenter at our event, where he has been participating each year since 2006. We are also grateful to Newton Police Chief Michael Richards for his participation at our event as his strong leadership and willingness to collaborate with this exciting program is deeply appreciated. We work to promote the Parents Who Host Lose the Most message in variety of ways, including a photo of youth from all ten high school that is used in handouts, yard signs, billboards and on social media links. This message is powerful and important and we were encouraged to see that youth use of alcohol was reduced 42% among 6th-12th graders in our recent countywide survey reflecting past 30 day use. This is a huge reduction in youth use of alcohol, which is very encouraging to see.

We are preparing to launch the Sussex County Recovery Coach Academy this month, where 25 people will become trained to be peer recovery coaches in an effort to assist those looking for help to start their way down a path to recovery from their substance use disorder. Additionally, we opened the door to a new office at our agency to assist with the C.L.EA.R. initiative, which will have its official use of recovery coaches in July. Lastly, we are very excited about the New Jersey Healthy Community Network grant we received earlier this year, where we are working to incorporate fitness and nutrition into clients treatment plans. This month we have begun introducing nutritious snacks and easy and fun ways to exercise into group sessions. More news next month as the plans continue to be unfolded.










Family Fun Camp


Marijuana Summit: I attended an informative summit on April 28 in Atlantic City with key state and national partners to learn more about issues associated with marijuana legalization. Ohio prevention specialists were successful in defeating that state's vote to legalize for recreational use when they educated business owners. Employers throughout New Jersey will want to learn more about potential legalization as it effects their bottom line. Quest Laboratories shows an increase nationwide in positive marijuana tests with workplace testing. Some questions employers need to ask themselves: How does marijuana legalization effect you as a business owner? Can your drug-free workplace policy prohibit employees from using marijuana? Will you have to pay for damage done by an employee under the influence of marijuana? Will you have to accommodate marijuana use in the workplace?

Spring Rx Collection:

Thank you to all our law enforcement partners who participated in Sussex County's DEA Rx collection efforts. In 2013, the total lbs. collected for the year was 1661, in 2014, it was 1926.6 lbs. and in 2015, the total was 2,343.7 lbs.

For the first quarter of 2016, Sussex County Rx collections totaled 643 lbs.

The promotion and collection of Rx in communities is a large part of the solution to the opiate addiction epidemic. Working together, we are making a difference. 
