Message from the Executive Director:

Dear Friends,

It truly takes a team effort to build a great agency. In reviewing this past year, it is evident that the many accomplishments shared within this report are a result of the remarkable teamwork by the Center for Prevention and Counseling's most important asset, all the people involved at our agency! The Board of Directors, the staff and our many volunteers and partners each play a valued part in moving us forward. The progress being seen provides tangible results of our recovery support



work that has been expanded along with an increase in our counseling reach. Additionally, our prevention work continues to see wonderful outcomes within and around the county due to three regional grants.

Due to our strong commitment to long-term stability, we embarked upon looking at the future as our Board and staff worked together to create a three year strategic plan. Building upon our strengths, we looked back to our roots with our focus on prevention and treatment and decided to add to our foundation a third pillar of recovery support. In doing so, we looked at all of our current programs and made the difficult decision to bring to a close our active collaboration with Pathways to Prosperity (P2), a program of NORWESCAP, which we have been a partner since 2008. In 2017, P2 will be under the NORWESCAP umbrella with the same commitment to those they serve, and they will be embraced by Christ Church in Newton as their new home. P2 has been a valued partnership serving a broad array of clients. We will continue to support the work of P2 and its ongoing growth as it is a vital service in Sussex County helping many achieve financial stability. We wish P2 success in all its endeavors and will remain committed in supporting their longevity and strength in their mission to those they serve.

Our dedicated staff has done a wonderful job of expanding our outreach and with strengthening our many programs and services offered to individuals and families. Here are some of the highlights from 2016:

- Collaborated with Newton Police Department, Sussex County Prosecutors Office, Newton Medical Center and other partners in the successful launch of the C.L.E.A.R. (Community Law Enforcement Addiction Recovery) initiative to assist individuals in finding treatment and recovery utilizing trained recovery coaches;
- ◆ Graduation of 19 certified Recovery Coaches through our Recovery Coach Academy to serve as peer recovery coaches with the C.L.E.A.R program;
- Growth with our recovery support work as seen with numerous workshops and trainings, including the introduction of All Recovery and SMART Recovery meetings in Sussex County;
- Passage of underage drinking ordinance in two more municipalities in Sussex County;
- Passage of 3 outdoor recreational ordinances and 3 ordinances to raise the sale of tobacco from 19 to 21 in northern New Jersey municipalities;
- Increase of counseling hours by 25% through the wide variety of treatment services offered;
- Receipt of the Federal Drug-Free Communities grant for an additional five years of funding for the Vernon Coalition and receipt of two years grant to mentor the neighboring Warwick (NY) Coalition;
- ♦ Continued growth in our *Changing the Face of Addiction* recovery walk with 55% increase in number of people walking to address the stigma surrounding addiction;

We are proud to share our work from 2016 as it was one of growth and achievement for our agency. The work we do would not be possible without the generous support and commitment of our Board of Trustees, donors, community partners and staff as we work together to provide hope, health and recovery to those we serve. Thank you wholeheartedly for being a part of the Center for Prevention and Counseling and our mission to serve individuals and families. We look forward to doing more great work in 2017!

Counseling:

Our clinical team is dedicated to ensuring best practices in treatment of substance use disorders and co-occurring mental health disorders. All of our committed team members are trained in a variety of treatment interventions including Cognitive Behavioral Therapy, Motivational Interviewing, Motivational Enhancement Therapy, 12 Step Facilitation Therapy and Family Systems Therapy. Our team meets twice weekly to ensure all of our clients needs are being met to the best of our ability.

Through a contract with the Sussex County Intoxicated Drivers Resource Center (IDRC), three counselors facilitate a weekend program once each month for people mandated to receive 12 hours of education as a result of receiving a DUI. These classes address the use of alcohol and other drugs, risky behavior, decision making and assists participants in exploring if they need to change their use of addictive substances.

In 2016, we provided **6,099** counseling hours for adults and youth. This was a **25%** increase over the prior year.

- 53% (3221 hours) were within one of the numerous groups for adolescents or adults.
- 47% (2878 hours) were one on one counseling sessions.

Outcomes:

99% stated they feel better about themselves as a result of their treatment.

97% stated they are better able to deal with their alcohol/drug problem after receiving counseling services at The Center.

99% of clients agreed that they helped to create their treatment goals.

99% stated they have a better understanding of addiction/substance use disorder after treatment at The Center.

96% agreed that as a result of their treatment, they are getting along better with their family.

Coalition for Healthy and Safe Communities:

10 Sticker Shock events were completed

5,690 Stickers were placed

- ★ 611 total members
- ★ Reached out to over **130** physicians, oral surgeons, dentists and other community members during the statewide "Knock Out Opiate Abuse Day" on October 6th
- ★ Over 2000 pounds of Prescription drugs were collected and properly disposed of
- ★ Assisted two townships in the county to successfully adopt Local Underage Drinking Ordinances, giving us a total of 22 who have done so
- ★ 2 County Police Departments received Mobile Rx disposal boxes



Anti-Bullying Specialist Meetings:

8 meetings were held with **28** school districts represented.

- ★ 96% of participants reported that they plan to use information discussed to address school climate in their school/district
- ★ "The meetings always help to generate ideas, helps me to strengthen what we already do— it's a time to focus on these activities, which is really helpful."

1 School Safety Team Training for **130** school teachers and counselors

★ "I believe it is important for us to get together and share ideas more often. I really felt that this was the best part of the workshop."



"Taking Flight to Change" Summit:

Over **1,000** Middle School and High School Mentors attended.

Surveys indicated:

- ★ 100% of high school leaders said that the Summit prepared them to be strong group leaders.
- ★ 99% of middle school students said that the Summit prepared them to be a person who goes out and makes a difference
- ★ 100% of advisors said the event helped their students understand the value of having a positive school climate.

Asset Building at Westside Enrichment Center

Westside Enrichment Center concluded a one year Asset-Building program for their pre-school students. Quarterly asset building trainings were held for staff and quarterly parent workshops were also provided. Center for Prevention staff members provided weekly asset-building lessons for 45 pre-school children. Funded by United Way of Northern New Jersey.

- ★ Held the first Parents As Champions training in Partnership with the Statewide Parent Advocacy Network for 10 parents
 - ★ 3 of these teams were awarded \$1,000 mini grant to complete their initiative

Tobacco Project:

- ★ 3 new communities passed ordinances to raise the age of sale for tobacco from 19 to 21
