


Most of us have something in our lives that's important enough to stand between us and drugs.

This year, **around 500 Sussex County students** from **26 different schools,** in grades 4-12th submitted an entry to the annual WYAD Contest or submitted an entry to "What Makes You Happy?" – a delightful addition designed to recognize and celebrate students in grades K-3, in an effort to promote healthy and positive messages, at a young age!

I dig holes in the sand to make a moat to sail my little tug boat Building sand castles is so much fun I love playing in the sun.



As parents, we all want what is best for our children. Simple everyday actions and conversations hold the potential to make a significant positive impact on your child's decision about alcohol and other drugs. Starting the conversation early and frequently helps build the foundation for future discussions, increases confidence, and keeps the lines of communication open with your youth. Research shows that parents, more than any other person or thing, influence their child's decision not to use alcohol. Take advantage of informal times to discuss underage drinking and communicate your family rules, whether during trips in the car or a family outing. Maybe a popular TV show glamorizes alcohol or a local incident involving substance use makes headlines; these instances serve as valuable teachable moments to reinforce your expectations and the risks regarding alcohol and other drugs.
